

I am certain that I have the **coolest job in the world.** I came into work recently, sat down on the couch in the front room of our Grace House on the campus of Georgia Tech, grabbed out my laptop and began working. Very quickly, I was joined by several students who cooked up some lunch, turned on an Adam Sandler movie, and struck up a conversation with me. We began laughing and joking and all at once it hit me – I'm at work, and this is my job. Wow! What an **amazing place** to be!

The ministry has been very busy this year. We've seen another growth in the regular attendance- the largest number of kids regularly on a Tuesday night that I have ever seen. Weekly we saw about **50 kids** this year. That's just crazy to me. Maybe that's small compared to big


